



Places to go

- 1 Grand Army Plaza**
The roof of the main entrance of Prospect Park, Cleonard and Woe warned the place to provide a wide and picturesque welcome to all visitors.
- 2 Vale of Cashmere**
Located in the park's northwestern end, just south of Grand Army Plaza, the Vale was originally the location of the park's first carousel. Now, it is decorated with single fountains surrounded by a custom garden of fast growth.
- 3 D. & B. Zucker Natural Exploration Area**
Wired one of the best of New York but New York Magazine, the Prospect Park Alliance used trees damaged by storms and other materials from within the Park to engage children with nature and encourage unstructured play.
- 4 Long Meadow**
Extending about a mile long and covering nearly 90 acres, this open meadow is one of the largest found in any New York City Park.
- 5 Prospect Park Zoo**
Home to nearly 400 animals of more than 100 species, kids will be amazed by some of the wild's most unusual animals.
- 6 Lefferts Historic House**
Built by Dutch family back in the 18th century, this beautiful house features a working garden, historic artifacts, period rooms and exhibits.
- 7 Carousel**
Carved in 1912 by Charles Cornell and restored in 1990, this carousel is one of the best of New York but New York Magazine, the Prospect Park Alliance used trees damaged by storms and other materials from within the Park to engage children with nature and encourage unstructured play.
- 8 Ravine**
A once rain down area of overuse and colonization is now home to a soothing stream, thick foliage and Brooklyn's only forest.
- 9 Picnic House**
A charming historic building with scenic views of the Long Meadow, floor-to-ceiling windows, hardwood floors and a working wood fireplace.
- 10 Litchfield Villa**
This building stands atop a hill with a refined 18th century exterior. Historic facade includes copper green roof and cupolas. It is a must see for any fan of beautiful architecture.
- 11 Audubon Center**
Enjoy free public programming that allows visitors of all ages to explore nature diversity in Prospect Park. These activities take place at the Bandshell, a historic landmark.
- 12 Nethermead**
A rolling meadow near the center of the Park, this is a great destination for dog walking, picnicking and birdwatching.
- 13 Bandshell**
Home to performing arts festivals, Celebrate Brooklyn! This area of the Park is the main destination for live outdoor entertainment.
- 14 Concert Grove**
This recently restored scenic setting was home to open-air concerts in the late 19th century.
- 15 White Levy Esplanade**
This area features walkways and picnic areas, with newly planted boulevards, native trees, shrubs and aquatic plants.
- 16 LeFrak Center at Lakeside**
This scenic and recreational destination provides seasonal ice skating, roller skating, fishing, boating and water play.
- 17 Drummer's Grove**
This has been a gathering place for drummers for over 50 years. Drumming takes place on Sundays from April to October, 2 pm to 7 pm.
- 18 Peninsula**
The Peninsula juts out into the Park's 40-acre lake, inviting all to enjoy the Park's beautiful terrain and views.
- 19 Wellhouse**
One of the park's oldest structures, now being adapted into the city's first compostable restroom in a public park.
- 20 Tennis Center**
One of the most popular tennis destinations Brooklyn has to offer. It features hard and clay courts and a seasonal tennis bubble for year-round play and evening tennis play.
